Then the Sovereign LORD showed me another vision. In it I saw a basket filled with ripe fruit. "What do you see, Amos?" he asked. I replied, "A basket full of ripe fruit." Then the LORD said, "Like this fruit, Israel is ripe for punishment! I will not delay their punishment again. In that day the singing in the temple will turn to wailing. Dead bodies will be scattered everywhere. They will be carried out of the city in silence. I, the Sovereign LORD, have spoken!"

Listen to this, you who rob the poor and trample down the needy!

You can't wait for the Sabbath day to be over and the religious festivals to end

so you can get back to cheating the helpless.

You measure out grain with dishonest measures and cheat the buyer with dishonest scales.

And you mix the grain you sell with chaff swept from the floor.

Then you enslave poor people for one piece of silver or a pair of sandals.

Now the LORD has sworn this oath by his own name, the Pride of Israel:

"I will never forget the wicked things you have done!

The earth will tremble for your deeds, and everyone will mourn.

The ground will rise like the Nile River at floodtime; it will heave up, then sink again.

"In that day," says the Sovereign LORD, "I will make the sun go down at noon and darken the earth while it is still day.

I will turn your celebrations into times of mourning and your singing into weeping.

You will wear funeral clothes and shave your heads to show your sorrow—

as if your only son had died. How very bitter that day will be!

"The time is surely coming," says the Sovereign LORD, "when I will send a famine on the land—not a famine of bread or water but of hearing the words of the LORD.

People will stagger from sea to sea and wander from border to border searching for the word of the LORD, but they will not find it."

Second Reading: Colossians 1:15-28


# 6 The righteous shall see and tremble, \* and they shall laugh at him, saying,

Christ Jesus is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers-- all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

And you who were once estranged and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, he has now reconciled in his fleshly body through death, so as to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him-- provided that you continue securely established and steadfast in the faith, without shifting from the hope promised by the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, became a servant of this gospel.

I am now rejoicing in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am completing what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church. I became its servant according to God's commission that was given to me for you, to make the word of God fully known, the mystery that has been hidden throughout the ages and generations but has now been revealed to his saints. To them God chose to make known how great among the Gentiles are the riches of the glory of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. It is he whom we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ.

As Jesus and his disciples went on their way, Jesus entered a certain village, where a woman named Martha welcomed him into her home. She had a sister named Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to what he was saying. But Martha was distracted by her many tasks; so she came to him and asked, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself? Tell her then to help me." But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her."
