historic Old North Church. We continue to draw on our library of music to draw attention to the Bible readings and themes of the day. George Sibley reads the lessons. music is by Black composers' settings of spirituals. It seems appropriate that we remember that the US was built in so many ways on the backs of the oppressed.

We expect to return to choral singing in the fall and I'm looking forward to returning Sunday morning Parish Choir singers, perhaps you'd like to join us? I'd love to talk to you about it. Please don't hesitate to give me a buzz or send a message.

This fall marks 20 years since I began directing music here. I'd like to celebrate by commissioning a choir anthem which will enrich what we do. One of the anthems we sing (and heard in this week video at 19:10) is "Beloved, let us love one another" by Michael Sitton. I think we like this because it is so gentle and simple sounding, yet challenging to keep the 2 parts in sync! I'm speaking with Dr. Sitton about him writing another piece not unlike this. His fee is \$2,500 and I hope you'll join me in helping to make this happen. You can contribute to the project by sending a check to the office with "Anthem Commission" in the memo line. Thank you.

Looking way ahead, please save the date: March 13, 2022, for an organ concert by David Briggs. David is currently artist in residence at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in NYC. He's also been organ scholar at King's College in Cambridge as well as Music Director at Gloucester Cathedral! I know that in this post pandemic time along with an interim period we'll be looking at new opportunities for worship, singing, fellowship and even food! This would consist of some of the Sunday morning choir, other friends, and perhaps you, if you're looking for a challenge!



I know a person in Christ who fourteen years ago was caught up to the third heaven—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know; God knows. And I know that such a person—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know; God knows— was caught up into Paradise and heard things that are not to be told, that no mortal is permitted to repeat. On behalf of such a one I will boast, but on my own behalf I will not boast, except of my weaknesses. But if I wish to boast, I will not be a fool, for I will be speaking the truth. But I refrain from it, so that no one may think better of me than what is seen in me or heard from me, even considering the exceptional character of the revelations. Therefore, to keep me from being too elated, a thorn was given me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to torment me, to keep me from being too elated. Three times I appealed to the Lord about this, that it would leave me, but he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." So, I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me. Therefore I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities for the sake of Christ; for whenever I am weak, then I am strong.


Beloved, since God loved us so much, we ought also to love one another. For if we love one another, God abides in us, and God's love will be perfected in us.

Mark 6:1-13

Jesus came to his hometown, and his disciples followed him. On the sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, "Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?" And they took offense at him. Then Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honor, except in their hometown, and among their own kin, and in their own house." And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them. And he was amazed at their unbelief.

Then he went about among the villages teaching. He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no

money in their belts; but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. He said to them, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them." So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.




